THE GOVERNOR GENERAL'S PERFORMING ARTS AWARDS

The Governor General's Performing Arts Awards are Canada's most prestigious honour in the performing arts. In 1992, Peter Herrndorf and Brian Robertson approached then-Governor General Ramon John Hnatyshyn (1934–2002) and his wife, Gerda, with their vision for the Awards. Since that time, the Awards have established themselves as the ultimate recognition from Canadians for Canadians whose accomplishments have inspired and enriched the cultural life of our country.

Laureates of the Lifetime Artistic Achievement
Award are selected from the fields of broadcasting
and film, classical music, dance, popular music, and
theatre. Nominations for this award and the Ramon John
Hnatyshyn Award for Voluntarism in the Performing
Arts are open to the public and solicited from across
the country. All nominations are reviewed by juries of
professionals in each discipline; each jury submits a short
list to the Board of Directors of the Governor General's
Performing Arts Awards Foundation (GGPAAF), which
makes the final selection.

Each laureate of a Lifetime Artistic Achievement Award receives a commemorative medallion and a \$25,000 cash prize provided by the Canada Council for the Arts.

Recipients of the Ramon John Hnatyshyn Award, which recognizes outstanding contribution in voluntary service to the performing arts in Canada, receive a commemorative medallion and a commissioned glass sculpture created by Canadian artist Naoko Takenouchi.

Recipients of the **National Arts Centre Award**, which recognizes work of an extraordinary nature in the previous performance year, are selected by a committee of senior programmers from the National Arts Centre (NAC). This award comprises a commemorative medallion, a \$25,000 cash prize provided by the NAC, and a commissioned work created by Canadian ceramic artist Paula Murray.

All commemorative medallions are generously donated by the Royal Canadian Mint.

The Awards also feature a unique **Mentorship Program** designed to benefit a talented mid-career artist.

The Program brings together a past Lifetime Artistic
Achievement Award recipient with a next-generation artist, helping them to develop their work, explore ideas and navigate career options. The Program is an opportunity for the laureates of tomorrow to benefit from the creativity and experience of icons who have blazed the trail before them. The Keg Spirit Foundation is the Founding Mentorship Program Partner.

The Awards are administered by the Governor General's Performing Arts Awards Foundation, a non-governmental, not-for-profit charitable organization based in Ottawa.

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

2022 GGPAA for Lifetime Artistic Achievement - Broadcasting and Film

FERNAND DANSEREAU

Film and television screenwriter, director and producer

Fernand Dansereau is a pioneer of Quebec film and television. Highly respected within the industry, he has written, produced or directed landmark works that have been acclaimed by colleagues and audiences alike; he has moved thousands of viewers with such television series as *Le parc des Braves* and *Les filles de Caleb*, and, more recently, with his trilogy of films on aging. With a keen understanding of the working classes and an instinct for hope in all things, he takes a clear and compassionate look at contemporary realities and strives to make the language of cinema accessible to everyone. As the founding president of the Institut national de l'image et du son, a professional multimedia training centre in Montréal, he continues to inspire the next generation today.

Fernand Dansereau was born in 1928 in Montréal. After a few years as a labour reporter for the newspaper *Le Devoir*, he joined the National Film Board in 1955, ultimately becoming head of French production.

From his first documentary in 1956, about Montréal's Jewish community, to his recent trilogy on old age (*Old Age and Laughter*, 2012; *Old Age and Eroticism*, 2017; and *Old Age and Hope*, 2019), Mr. Dansereau has tackled subjects as diverse as the environment, education, Quebec's Indigenous peoples and Alzheimer's disease. His television screenwriting credits include the series *Le parc des Braves*, *Les filles de Caleb 1* (which was so popular that, he recalls, "they closed the shopping centres on Thursday nights because everyone was home watching TV"), *Shehaweh* and *Caserne 24*. In all, he has directed more than 90 films and produced about 50, and scripted nearly 200 hours of television.

A passionate advocate for government support for the sector, Mr. Dansereau served as vice-president of the Association des réalisateurs et réalisatrices du Québec and president of the Institut québécois du cinéma, and was on the advisory committee for the drafting of Quebec's law on the status of the artist.

He is also a writer and painter: his first novel, *Le cœur en cavale*, was published in 2003, and the city of Saint-Bruno presented an exhibition of his artwork in 2019.

Fernand Dansereau is a Member of the Order of Canada, an Officer of the Ordre national du Québec and a Companion of the Ordre des arts et des lettres du Québec. His numerous awards include a Jutra, two Gémeaux, and the Prix Albert-Tessier.

RITA SHELTON DEVERELL

Television broadcaster, theatre artist, scholar and activist

Throughout her distinguished career in broadcasting, journalism and theatre, Rita Shelton Deverell has stood out for her innovation, creativity and inclusion. Driven by her commitment to social justice, she has focused on telling the stories of those whose voices are often unheard. She co-founded VisionTV, the world's first multifaith, multicultural network, and is one of the first Black women in Canada to be a television host and network executive. An inspiring mentor, she is a role model for young artists, students and audiences alike.

Born in 1945 in Houston, Texas, Dr. Deverell joined CBC TV in 1973, ultimately becoming a producer and host. In 1988 she co-founded VisionTV, where she produced and appeared on several shows, including the series *Skylight* (Gemini, Best Lifestyle Information Series) and *It's About Time* (Gemini, excellence in mainstream television programming reflecting Canada's racial and cultural diversity). She also created *Arts Express*, which explores the intersection between spirituality and the arts.

From 2002 to 2005 she was news director of the Aboriginal Peoples Television Network, and mentored her Indigenous successor.

She retired from broadcasting in 2005 and returned to drama, her first profession. Her play *Who You Callin Black Eh?* won the Teen Jury prize at the 2019 Toronto Fringe Festival, and she received a Canada Council grant to create a "pivot" digital version.

She is the author of several books, most recently *American Refugees: Turning to Canada for Freedom* (2019).

Of her multifaceted career, Dr. Deverell notes, "One of the reasons I have worked at so many things is that when a door or a wall or a glass ceiling is put up around me, rather than beating my head against it, I change direction."


Dr. Deverell is a trustee of the Royal Ontario Museum, a director of CBC/Radio-Canada, and an adjunct professor at Mount Saint Vincent and Lakehead universities. Her multimedia kit *Women, Contemporary Aboriginal Issues and Resistance* (2013), available on the National Film Board's Campus portal, was produced while she was the Nancy's Chair of Women's Studies at Mount Saint Vincent. In 2021 she was named chancellor of Lakehead, the first person of colour to hold that position.

Rita Shelton Deverell is a Member of the Order of Canada. Other awards and honours include two Geminis, the Black Women's Civic Engagement Network's Leadership Award, membership in the Canadian Association of Broadcasters Hall of Fame, and ACTRA Woman of the Year.

2022 GGPAA for Lifetime Artistic Achievement - Popular Music

DAVID FOSTER

Songwriter, composer, performer, producer and philanthropist

David Foster is one of Canada's most successful popular music writers and producers. He has worked with leading music artists across the country and around the world, and helped launch the careers of such exceptional talents as Celine Dion, Michael Bublé and Josh Groban. A generous philanthropist, notably through his eponymous foundation, he has donated his time and talent to more than 400 charities, and has hosted, produced or directed numerous benefit concerts.

David Foster was born in 1949 in Victoria, B.C. From his early days as a studio musician, arranger and recording artist, he became one of the most successful songwriters and record producers in history, shepherding albums that have collectively sold in the hundreds of millions. As a performer, he has become a household name throughout Asia, where he tours annually. He is currently gearing up to take on Broadway with a new musical about the animated character Betty Boop.

Nicknamed "The Hit Man," he is known for his collaborations with Barbra Streisand, Natalie Cole, Celine Dion, Whitney Houston, Andrea Bocelli, Josh Groban, Michael Bublé and the group Chicago, and for the successful charity single "Tears Are Not Enough." He produced such international hits as "Hard Habit to Break," "The Glory of Love," "The Power of Love," "Un-Break My Heart" and "I Will Always Love You," and created soundtracks for the blockbuster films *The Bodyguard, Urban Cowboy* and *St. Elmo's Fire*.

"If there's any magic at all to what I do," he says, "it's that I try to create surprise moments where I imagine the audience would leap to their feet." Among his favourite compositions, he cites "The Prayer," a duet he wrote for Celine Dion and Andrea Bocelli.

In 1986, he established the David Foster Foundation, a charitable organization that provides financial support to Canadian children in need of life-saving organ transplants.

David Foster is an Officer of the Order of Canada and a Member of the Order of British Columbia. He has won 16 Grammy Awards, an Emmy, a Golden Globe and the Juno Humanitarian Award; he is a member of the Canadian Walk of Fame, Canadian Music Hall of Fame, Canadian Songwriters Hall of Fame and Hollywood Walk of Fame, and has two honorary doctorates. *David Foster: Off the Record*, an official feature documentary on his life and career, was released in 2019.

TOMSON HIGHWAY

Author (plays, novels, non-fiction), pianist and songwriter

Tomson Highway is one of Canada's most acclaimed writers and performers. His work shines a light on Indigenous people and culture; his plays (which include the award-winning *The Rez Sisters* and *Dry Lips Oughta Move to Kapuskasing*) are taught and performed around the world. A classically trained pianist, he has lectured and performed across Canada and abroad, and is a highly entertaining and sought-after speaker on topics ranging from music and literature to diversity in the workplace.

Tomson Highway was born in 1951 in northern Manitoba, in a tent hastily pitched in a snowbank. He obtained a BMus in piano performance and the equivalent of a BA in English; before turning to composing and writing, he worked as a social worker on First Nations reserves and in urban centres across Canada. He was also involved in creating several Indigenous music and arts festivals, and was artistic director of Native Earth Performing Arts in Toronto for six years.

Mr. Highway achieved international recognition in 1986 with his sixth play, the multi-award-winning *The Rez Sisters*, followed in 1989 by *Dry Lips Oughta Move to Kapuskasing*, which not only won numerous awards but was the first Canadian play to receive a full production at Toronto's Royal Alexandra Theatre. His later plays include *Rose* and the musicals *Ernestine Shuswap Gets Her Trout* and *The (Post) Mistress*.

His novel *Kiss of the Fur Queen*, based on his experiences at residential school, was a Canadian bestseller. He has published three children's books, all written bilingually in Cree (his mother tongue) and English. His memoir *Permanent Astonishment* won the 2021 Hilary Weston Writers' Trust Prize for Nonfiction.

He wrote (in Cree) the libretti for two operas, *Pimooteewin* and *Chaakapesh: The Trickster's Quest.* His third CD is scheduled for release in 2022.

In life as in his work, Mr. Highway exudes irrepressible delight. "Joy is the very centre of my existence," he says. "It inspires me, it moves me forward, it makes my spirit dance."

Tomson Highway is an Officer of the Order of Canada. His other awards and honours include three Dora Mavor Moore Awards, two Floyd S. Chalmers Canadian Play Awards, Toronto Arts Award, National Indigenous Achievement Award (now the Indspire Award), and honorary degrees from 11 Canadian universities. In 1998, *Maclean's* magazine named him one of the "100 most important people in Canadian history."

2022 GGPAA for Lifetime Artistic Achievement - Dance

LINDA RABIN

Dancer, teacher, choreographer and somatic movement educator

A pioneer of contemporary dance in Canada, Linda Rabin has more than 50 years of experience as a dancer, teacher and choreographer. As a somatic movement educator, she helps artists and individuals from all backgrounds realize their personal and creative processes, both onstage and in their daily lives. An explorer by nature, she has travelled widely and is keenly interested in the cultures and rituals of different countries. As a workshop leader across Canada and internationally, she generously shares her lifelong passion: exploring movement as art, as a transformational process, and as a healing and spiritual practice.

Ms. Rabin was born in 1946 in Montréal, where she studied creative modern dance with Elsie Salomons. After graduating from New York's prestigious Juilliard School, she worked for Israel's Batsheva Dance Company and London's Ballet Rambert, and studied various movement, theatre and voice techniques.

In 1981, with colleague Candace Loubert, she founded Les ateliers de danse moderne de Montréal inc. (now the École de danse contemporaine de Montréal), one of Canada's foremost contemporary dance schools.

Ms. Rabin has taught and choreographed at leading dance companies and institutions in Canada and internationally, including Les Grands Ballets Canadiens, Winnipeg's Contemporary Dancers, Dancemakers, Batsheva Dance Company and Nederlands Dans Theater 2. She has performed in the choreographies of such prominent Canadian artists as Daniel Léveillé, Jean-Sébastien Lourdais, Aurélie Pedron, Mélanie Demers, and Tedd Robinson and Margie Gillis. Among her career highlights is the performance of her iconic work *The White Goddess*, a ritualistic ensemble piece inspired by Robert Graves's book of the same name, an unconventional treatise on mythology from a decidedly feminist angle.

She is a certified practitioner of Body-Mind Centering® and an authorized teacher of Continuum, a practice she studied under its founder, Emilie Conrad, that remains at the heart of her work. Of her introduction to Continuum, Ms. Rabin recalls, "I understood in that moment that this is what I was called to do. I was seeing and feeling within my body the inner source of movement. I interpreted this experience as 'the diamond essence of dance'."

Linda Rabin is a Member of the Order of Canada, a Distinguished Member of Quebec's Order of Excellence in Education, and a laureate of the Prix Contribution exceptionnelle de la danse de Montréal.

MICHELLE SMITH

Michelle Smith is a rare pearl indeed: a dedicated volunteer with a background in finance who loves fundraising. As such, she is often called upon for her generosity, creativity and boundless energy. Through her active involvement with and support of many Francophone community and arts organizations in her home province of Manitoba, she has made an indelible contribution to the cultural and linguistic vitality of her community.

A native of Sainte-Anne-des-Chênes, Michelle Smith has volunteered notably with Théâtre Cercle Molière (TCM), Canada's oldest theatre company, which attracts more than 10,000 patrons every year. As a member of its fundraising committee, she helped raise over \$2 million to build a new theatre centre, marking the first time a Franco-Manitoban organization had raised such a significant amount for an infrastructure project. Subsequently, as chair of the board, she spearheaded the establishment of an endowment fund that currently exceeds \$1 million and provides TCM with a stable annual income.

Among other achievements, she helped establish the Maison Gabrielle-Roy (restoration of the beloved author's childhood home), and has done volunteer fundraising for Francofonds (Manitoba's Francophone community foundation) and Le 100 Nons (an organization dedicated to training and promoting Francophone music artists).

"I'm passionate about creating and implementing fundraising strategies," she says. "It's important for me to contribute in my own way to the development of Manitoba's cultural family. Art is the language of the heart, and it's of paramount importance to the vitality of our communities."

She also supports the Dead of Winter choir (formerly Camerata Nova), the Manitoba Chamber Orchestra, the Prairie Theatre Exchange, the Royal Winnipeg Ballet and the Manitoba Opera, among others. She is also a member of Les blés au vent community choir.

Ms. Smith recently retired from her career as an independent financial planner. She is the co-author of *Les Manitobaines engagées*, an anthology of autobiographies by Francophone women, published in 2021 to commemorate the centennial of women's suffrage in Manitoba.

2022 National Arts Centre Award

CRYSTAL PITE

Choreographer and director

In a choreographic career spanning three decades, Crystal Pite has created more than 50 works for dance companies in Canada and around the world. She is the founding artistic director of the Vancouver-based company Kidd Pivot, world renowned for radical hybrids of dance and theatre that are assembled with a keen sense of wit and invention. Ms. Pite is known for works that courageously address such challenging and complex themes as trauma, addiction, conflict, consciousness and mortality; her bold and original vision has earned her international acclaim and inspired an entire generation of dance artists.

Crystal Pite was born in Terrace, B.C., and grew up in Victoria. She began her dance career as a company member of Ballet British Columbia (Ballet BC), then William Forsythe's Ballett Frankfurt. She made her choreographic debut in 1990 at Ballet BC, and has since created works for such prominent companies as The Royal Ballet, the Paris Opera Ballet, Nederlands Dans Theater 1, Cullberg Ballet, Ballett Frankfurt, the National Ballet of Canada, Ballets Jazz Montréal (resident choreographer 2001–04), and Cedar Lake Contemporary Ballet. She has also collaborated with Electric Company Theatre and Robert Lepage, and is currently associate choreographer of Nederlands Dans Theater 1, associate dance artist of Canada's National Arts Centre, and associate artist of Sadler's Wells in London.

In 2002, she formed Kidd Pivot, a company that strives to distil and translate universal questions into artworks that connect us to deep and essential parts of humanity. "Running through all of my work is the question of what moves us," she says. Kidd Pivot tours internationally with such critically acclaimed works as *Betroffenheit* and *Revisor* (both co-created with playwright Jonathon Young), *The Tempest Replica, Dark Matters, Lost Action* and *The You Show*.

ALEXINA LOUIE, O.C., O.ONT., FRSC Mentor

One of Canada's most celebrated composers, Alexina Louie (GGPAA 2021) writes music with an imaginative and spiritual blend of Asian and Western influences. She has written for all musical genres, from piano, voice and orchestra to opera, film and ballet. Her impressive body of work totals nearly 80 compositions, including Take the Dog Sled, for two Inuit throat singers and seven musicians; Scenes from a Jade Terrace, for solo piano, commissioned by Jon Kimura Parker; O Magnum Mysterium: In Memoriam Glenn Gould, for 44 individual string parts; and The Scarlet Princess, a full-length opera. In 2017, Canada's 150th anniversary year, her Triple Concerto for Three Violins and Orchestra, jointly commissioned by the Toronto Symphony, the National Arts Centre Orchestra and the Orchestre symphonique de Montréal, was performed by all three orchestras. In 2019, the prestigious Honens International Piano Festival, the Canadian Music Centre and Ireland's Finding A Voice Festival each honoured her with a concert devoted to her compositions.

Ms. Louie is an Officer of the Order of Canada, a member of the Order of Ontario, and a fellow of the Royal Society of Canada. Her many awards and honours include the Queen Elizabeth II Golden and Diamond Jubilee medals, two Juno Awards, the Jules Léger Prize for New Chamber Music, and, most recently, the Canada Council for the Arts Molson Prize.



CHRISTOPHER GODDARD

Protégé

Christopher Goddard is a Canadian composer and pianist. As a composer, he has collaborated with NYO Canada, Esprit Orchestra, the Nouvel Ensemble Moderne, Continuum, Ensemble Paramirabo, the Orchestre de la Francophonie, and Play duo, No Exit New Music Ensemble, NOISE-BRIDGE duo, and others. Recent commissions have come from the Lucerne Festival. Koerner Hall at The Royal Conservatory, and the City of Reutlingen. Recorded on the Innova and Naxos Classics labels, his music has been broadcast by BBC Radio 3 and CBC Radio 2 and can also be heard on iTunes. As a performer, he has presented dozens of premieres by his colleagues and appeared with new music groups and at contemporary music festivals across North America and in Europe.

Mr. Goddard holds a D.Mus. in composition and a B.Mus. in composition and theory from McGill University, an M.M. in contemporary performance from the Manhattan School of Music, and an M.M. in composition from Rice University (Houston, Texas). His work has been recognized by the MacDowell Foundation, the Graham Sommer Competition for Young Composers, the Prix collégien de musique contemporaine, the SOCAN Young Composer Awards, and the Robert Avalon Competition for Young Composers. He currently lectures at the University of Florida School of Music.

Teresa Alfeld is an award-winning documentary and drama writer/director from Vancouver, BC, and the unceded Coast Salish territories of the Musqueam, Squamish and Tsleil-Waututh Nations. She is a member of the Directors Guild of Canada and the Documentary Organization of Canada. Her directing credits include the feature documentaries Doug and the Slugs and Me (2022) and The Rankin File: Legacy of a Radical (2018), and short films Bossbabe (2022), Jean Swanson: We Need a New Map (2021), Roadkill (2014) and Charlie Gauvin (2013).

Barry Bilinsky | Tomson Highway

Barry Bilinsky (he/him) is an Indigenous artist from Amiskwaciywaskahikan (Edmonton) of Métis, Cree and Ukrainian lineage. Primarily a professional theatre and film director, Barry pursues work focused on Indigenous stories that are often connected to the cultural intersections he embodies. Working in technical as well as artistic roles, he believes that collaborative and holistic practices are the best way to ensure that diverse perspectives are represented.

Pascal Boutroy | Michelle Smith

Pascal Boutroy is an independent director and scriptwriter based in Winnipeg, Manitoba. He has been working in film and television production for the past 20 years. He has written and directed many documentary series for television, in addition to writing and developing screenplays for feature-length films. In 1996, he co-founded Freeze Frame, the International Film Festival for Kids of All Ages, one of the biggest and longest-running film festivals in Manitoba.

Joella Cabalu | Crystal Pite

Joella Cabalu is a Filipino Canadian documentary filmmaker based in Vancouver, BC. Her award-winning projects, including *Koto: The Last Service* (2021), Ode to a Seafaring People (2021), First Photo Here (2020)

and *It Runs in the Family* (2015), explore narratives about intimacies, identities and relationships. Currently, she is producing her first feature documentary, *Back Home* (Telefilm Talent to Watch Program 2019).

Christine Chevarie-Lessard | Linda Rabin

Christine Chevarie-Lessard is a content creator working in film, television, radio and digital media. She directed the documentary feature *A Delicate Balance*, which premiered at RIDM in 2018, winning the Women Inmates' Award and obtaining a Gémeaux nomination, and the short films *The Vigil* (2020), *La comédienne d'Amérique* (2013) and *Quand tout est possible* (2011). Her television projects include *Les voleurs d'identité* (Télé-Québec, 2020), which earned two nominations at the 2021 Gémeaux. Christine has also produced radio content and podcasts for Radio-Canada.

Sara Elgamal | Rita Shelton Deverell

Sara Elgamal is an award-winning director of visually captivating and authentic stories cultivated with intention. Having both directed and produced a wealth of documentaries, branded content, music videos and short films for clients across the globe, she embeds her experiences when travelling with her own curiosity, creating cinematic, engaging and human-first visuals.

Sylvie Lapointe | Fernand Dansereau

Sylvie Lapointe has been working in documentary film since 1995. In addition to teaching at INIS in 2018, she has directed and produced short and feature-length films, both locally and internationally, including *Vue de ruelle* (Montreal, 2017–18), about urban ecology; *The Lesson of the Snail* (Mexico, 2012), on political education; and *Yanina, guerilléra ou coopérante?* (Guatemala, 2001), which explored social engagement.
